The Statutory Code of Practice on the Delivery of Autism Services Delivery Plan 2021-22

The autism code of practice comes into force on 1 September 2021. It gives clarity to local health boards, local authorities and Regional Partnership Boards on the Social Services and Well-being (Wales) Act and/or the NHS (Wales) Act 2006 and the responsibilities and services they are required to provide to support autistic people in their day to day lives. This delivery plan outlines the first year of priorities for this Senedd Term. Future priorities will be informed by outcomes of the demand and capacity review of neurodevelopmental services due to be completed March 2022.

The effective implementation of this first phase will rely on collaborative working and learning from feedback from autistic people, their families and carers. The first table (below) assigns each delivery organisation a number. This corresponds to the 'Who is Involved' section in the delivery plan to show which organisations are responsible for delivering the priority area. The views of autistic people, their families and/or carers along with stakeholders will be central in measuring the success of each priority area.
