General overview of teaching in schools in 21-22 The three Welsh Confucius Institutes (Cls) have collaborated with well over 20% more schools this year compared to last year. The number of schools we have worked with this year is higher than in 20-21 (we were working with 41 schools by summer 21 compared to over 56 in March 22). Additionally, there were well over twice the amount of teaching hours and pupil numbers at the end of 21-22 compared to this time last year.

Teaching figures for primary schools The three Welsh CIs are teaching classes on a regular basis to over 800 primary school pupils in 12 schools across Wales. Almost half of the classes we are currently teaching in are in primary schools (32 out of 69). Just under a third of Confucius Classrooms are primary schools (5 out of 16). 287 pupils from five schools are taking courses in YCT exam preparation. Well over half of the pupils who were signed up for Cardiff CI's online Chinese New Year Festival/recorded sessions were from primary schools or home-taught primary age children (years 1-6). Primary schools also had the opportunity to take part in in-person

		and online activities arranged by the CIs at UWTSD and Bangor Universities. Primary school pupils have also been involved in a range of one-off/irregular activities such as: • Languages Days at individual schools. • Cardiff University's Widening Participation Summer Festival. • The Cardiff Celebration of Collaboration with Hubs & Libraries such as the European Day of Languages and a community Chinese New Year event. Over half of the classes we are currently teaching are in secondary schools (37 out of 69). Just under half of the pupils who were signed up for Cardiff CI's online Chinese New Year Festival/recorded sessions were from secondary schools or home-taught secondary age children (years 7-13). Secondary schools also had the opportunity to take part in inperson and online activities arranged by the CIs at UWTSD and Bangor Universities. Two thirds of Confucius Classrooms are secondary schools (11 out of 16).

- In April, UWTSD organised a series of Chinese Taster Days for 120
 Year 8 and 9 students from seven schools across Carmarthenshire,
 Ceredigion and Pembrokeshire. Pupils had the chance to visit
 UWTSD campuses and experience a full day of Chinese culture
 activities organised in collaboration with SEREN foundation.
- In July 21, the CIs at Bangor and UWTSD held one and two-week Chinese language and culture summer schools for secondary school pupils. 11 students from four secondary schools attended the Bangor CI summer school, and UWTSD CI's Summer School attracted five participants from year 12.
- Five pupils from two schools in North and South Wales are currently taking part in the Chinese Bridge for secondary schools (UK competition), organised by CLEC UK. The contest is a Mandarinspeaking competition for secondary school students.
- Secondary school pupils have been involved in one-off/irregular activities such as Languages Days at individual schools, Cardiff University's Widening Participation Summer Festival, the Cardiff celebration of Collaboration with Hubs & Libraries; the European Day of Languages and a community Chinese New Year event.
