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General Notes

- 0.1 The return covers number of persons or occurrences of persons, not number of households.
- 1.2 The Homelessness Accommodation Provision and Rough Sleeping data collection was introduced during the Covid-19 pandemic as a result of the immediate emergency health response.
- This monthly management data collection relates to the number of individuals experiencing homelessness and being supported by 0.3 local authorities into temporary accommodation or suitable long-term accommodation, whereas the less frequent collections on statutory homelessness capture data on the number of households.
- This monthly management information is used extensively internally to inform policy and funding decisions, by providing vital and timely intelligence to support our understanding of the ongoing pressures faced in Wales, and how we can best respond to these.
- 0.5 Please note that the data in tables 1-3 is not expected to sum/ 'read across' as they are collecting different sets of individuals and their interactions with temporary accommodation.

Non self contained accommodation where bath/shower, inside WC, kitchen, living and possibly even sleeping facilities are shared.

Row 3 Hostels include shared accommodation, owned or leased and managed by either a local authority, housing association or non profit making organisation including reception centres, emergency units and night shelters. Male refuges should be included with hostels.

Women's refuge

Row 4 Safe house accommodation for women, with or without their children, escaping domestic abuse.
